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Walk to Emmaus

In the last couple of years, our congregation has been on journey, a Fruitful Congregation Journey. This journey has brought us together to develop vision and mission statements, effective ministries and discipleship pathways. That journey is almost complete but I have another opportunity to strengthen our spiritual lives.



The Gospel of Luke relates the story of Christ joining two friends on the road to the town of Emmaus. The risen Christ walks with them explaining scripture. The illuminating climax of the story comes when Jesus joins the friends at a house. He breaks the bread, blesses it and gives it to the friends. At that moment, the eyes of the two are opened, they recognize Jesus and rush out to tell others.

This story provides the image for the Walk to Emmaus, an Upper Room program that calls forth and restores Christian discipleship. The Walk to Emmaus, a three-day experience, takes a New Testament look at Christianity as a lifestyle. It is a highly structured weekend, designed to strengthen and invigorate the faith of Christian people to then invigorate their families, congregations and the world around them. It exists to develop Christian leaders for the local church and the world. The Walk models Christ's servanthood and encourages us to be a servant to all. The Walk to Emmaus combines the efforts of laity and clergy to renew the world.

The Walk to Emmaus is a renewing of the spirit within us. There is music, singing, learning, worship, laughter, tears and plenty of eating! It is not a cult or secret society. But, what one experiences there is truly an individual experience shared with God.

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Back in the late sixties a group called Simon and Garfunkel wrote a song that stated, "I am a rock, I am an island." It indicated that no matter what happened to them they could stand strong and that they had isolated themselves so no one else could hurt them. It may sound like a noble statement, but in reality we are flesh and bone and we have been created as social creatures and cannot function normally without contact with other people.

I have to confess that it has been a battle in my own life to get close to others. As a minister you feel like you need to have all the answers, all the time, and that you can never get down because you've always got to be positive. We've been taught and, frankly, most people expect, their minister to always be up, never depressed and ready with the answers they need in their lives. The truth of the matter is that no one minister can completely and always fulfill such a role. That's because we are all human. We all need friends and someone we can confide in. That's a lesson I've learned the hard way. I've shared many of my own blunders, mistakes, and sometimes out right sins with you through my sermons and personal conversations. I've done that because frankly people need to know that ministers are human too. They do make mistakes and they do need friendships and understanding from others.

I'm reminded of a time when I let three very good back-yard mechanics think that

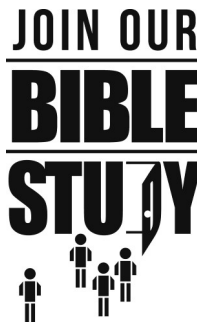

Trimble assigned as new Indiana Conference Bishop

The Committee on Episcopacy of the North Central Jurisdiction announced the assignment of Bishop Julius C. Trimble to the Indiana Episcopal Area Saturday, July 16. Bishop Trimble will begin his service Thursday, September 1, 2016.

Trimble will succeed Bishop Michael J. Coyner who has served the Indiana Conference for the past 12 years and will retire Wednesday, August 31, 2016.



Trimble previously served as the resident bishop of the Iowa Area for the past eight years. A native of Chicago, he was ordained deacon and elder in the Northern Illinois Conference where he served two churches before transferring to the East Ohio Conference. He served churches in the Cleveland, Ohio area and as District Superintendent of the Cleveland District from 1996-2003.

A graduate of Illinois State University and Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, he received his Doctor of Ministry degree from Ashland Theological Seminary. A strong advocate for social justice and increased attention to ministries addressing mental health issues, he has promoted ministries related to domestic violence and the role of the faith community. Bishop Trimble has worked with ecumenical leadership in Iowa in response to gun violence and immigration reform. He serves as Chairperson of the United Methodist Interagency Immigration Task Force.

Before his election as a bishop, he served as Adjunct Instructor at United Methodist-related Baldwin-Wallace College in Berea, OH where he taught courses on the African American religious experience and the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Married to Racelder Grandberry-Trimble, a professional counselor and graduate of Methodist Theological School of Ohio. They are the parents of three adult children: Cameron, Candiace, and Julius Thomas.

Bishop Trimble has preached throughout the United States and in Africa. He is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Bishop James S. Thomas Leadership Award.

We need each other, and the Bible has many statements giving us instructions on how to treat each other. Here are some examples:

Romans 15:7 tells us that we are to accept each other just as Christ has accepted us.

Galatians 5:13 tells us that we are to serve each other in love.

Galatians 6:2 tells us that we are to carry each other's burdens.

Colossians 3:13 tells us that we are to accept each other and forgive those things that come between us.

1 Thessalonians 5:11 tells us that we are to encourage and build each other up.

And 1 Peter 4:9 tells us to be hospitable to each other without grumbling or complaining.

I'd say that this is a lot of proof that we need each other. Always remember that the sign and evidence of our Christian experience is that we love one another. All of these passages that talk about how we should treat our fellow believers are examples of this love. This is how the world knows that we are Christians. It isn't by how holy we are or how much we know, but how much we love our brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus.

Until God places the last piece, the final picture is a mystery to us. But in the meantime, God offers order and purpose, providing his law as the puzzle’s edges.

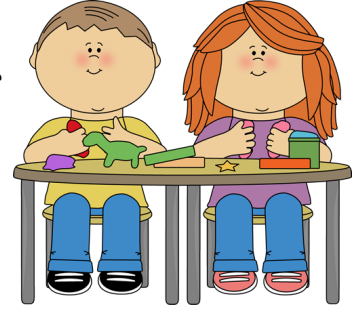
