George Buttrick tells a story about a time when he met a farmer who had just rescued a lost sheep. When Buttrick asked the farmer how the sheep got lost, the farmer replied, "They just nibble themselves lost." They go, he explained, from one tuft of grass to another, until at last they've lost their way.

We can lose our way pretty easily and pretty quickly by moving from one little thing, one little tuft of grass, to another. After days, hours, weeks, months, or years we look up and we realize we are lost, nothing looks familiar. We lose our way when we focus on the little things and lose track of our main thing. We seek first the things that are not really important.

Think about the image: our lives as a sheep and Jesus Christ as the Good Shepherd. When we listen to His voice and follow His leadership, life has a sense of peace about it. When we listen to our own voice and follow a different path and just nibble ourselves from one little tuft of grass to another, we find ourselves lost.

As we enter into the New Year it is important to remember that the Good Shepherd is calling our name and looking for us. It doesn't matter what we have done or how lost we have become, He wants to welcome us back to the family of faith. He wants us to be able to share these words like his servant David did.

"The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me besides quiet waters, he restores my soul. He guides me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me, in the presence of my enemies. You

The meaning of Epiphany

Epiphany, which comes from the Greek word epiphaneia, means "an appearance" or "a revealing." Centuries ago, the church set aside January 6, the 12th day after Christmas, to mark the revealing of Jesus



as Christ to the wise men. who were Gentiles. Jesus' first followers were Jewish, so the revelation of the divine Christ to the non-Jewish magi reminds us that Jesus came to earth to save

the whole world.

Symbols of Epiphany include light, a star, a crown (or three crowns) and a globe or stylized portrayal of the world. The color of Epiphany is green to symbolize life, growth, hope and eternity.

On the church calendar, the Epiphany season lasts until Ash Wednesday, which is determined by the date of Easter.

Detailed Instructions:

At no cost to you, help the Southwest Indian children. Collect postage stamps and labels. Give them to Barbara Hart. She has volunteered to get them to Mary Emma Holmes who mails them to Peoria, Arizona, to Joan Smothermon (Dale Parker's sister). Dale and Becky can tell you all about the mission as they worked there.

Preferably, stamps should be left on the envelope with at least 1/4 to 1/8 inch around the border of the stamp. They can't have any tears or missing parts. They must be whole.

Foreign and commemorative stamps are the most valuable, but all whole stamps are being collected and are appreciated by the school.

The school also collects Box Tops for Education labels and Campbell's Soup labels, including soups, beans, FrancoAmerican, gravies, Spaghettio's, Pepperidge Farm products, Prego, and Market Day.

Box Top for Education labels are found on Generals Mills products (over 40 kinds of cereal, 20 refrigerated and dairy products, and 20 baking products), Pillsbury frozen products, snacks and meals, and sides such a Hamburger Helper.

Such discoveries — regardless of how old or new the species are — demonstrate the ongoing creativity of God, who both does new things and gives people new abilities to discover them.



Before all else fails ...

In *Too Busy Not to Pray* (InterVarsity Press), Bill Hybels cites reasons that prayers may seem to go unanswered (unconfessed sin, selfishness and so on). The most common cause, though, is prayerlessness:

"People often tell me how they have attempted to address a pressing need,"

Hybels writes. "They have gone to counselors, read self-help books, claimed biblical promises, practiced self-discipline, confided in Christian friends, practiced assertiveness or submission or selfdenial or positive thinking,

even read books about prayer — and their need is still not met." But when asked if they've prayed "fervently and regularly" about the matter, the answer is usually no.

James 4:2 says, "You do not have because you do not ask God." So instead of thinking "When all else fails, pray," try this: "Pray before all else fails." O God of new beginnings and wonderful surprises, thank you for the gift of a new year. May it be a time of grace for me, a time to grow in faith and love, a time to renew my commitment to following Your Son, Jesus. *A Prayer for the New Year May it be a year of blessing for me, a time to cherish my family and friends, a time to renew my efforts at work, a time to embrace my faith more fully.* Walk with me, please, in every day and every hour of
