There is something special about these two holy days which will cause many who normally do not attend ongoing fellowship at a church, and they will come together and hear God's salvation call. Is it because there's children's programs which our children/grandchildren are participating in, and we come to support them? Is it an "obligation" which we feel we owe God and hope He sees we're still here and trying to improve our chances of showing the "goodness" we have? The answers varies with each person. Technology Update

Many churches, Solid Rock included, had to get creative during the COVID pandemic in finding new ways to keep our faith families connected. Solid Rock applied for and received a grant providing equipment enabling us to livestream our services. We have members living at a distance, Heritage Pointe residents, and others in our community who are otherwise unable to participate in person joining us each week. As many of you share links to our services, our reach extends far beyond our community.

We are at a point where, in order to continue to offer quality sound and video, both inside our sanctuary and online, upgrades to our equipment are being considered. Specifically we would like to replace

our nearly 10-year-old analog sound console with an up-to-date digital system. A fund has been established and donations are greatly appreciated.

We have a small dedicated team of volunteers who faithfully work to keep sound, video, and online broadcasting operating each week, but we are in need of additional volunteers to step in when our regulars are away or have other obligations.



Current roles include operation of the sound mixing board, the camera for livestreams, the camera for children's messages, and projection and streaming. Writing our life — with God's help

A journalist once said you can measure the quality of a piece of writing by the quality of what has been cut. No matter how beautiful or interesting a phrase or sentence is, the piece may be stronger without it.

Rabbi Evan Moffic applies this wisdom to life in general. Too often we refuse to let something — a habit, a memory, a process

— go, even when it no longer serves us. Thinking of our life as a book, we can cut out, edit or rearrange some pages or sentences to reflect our new learnings and growth.




This is not always easy, but we don't have to do it alone. "God is our 'editor-in-chief,'" says Moffic, "and we are part of God's story."

[While] God ... gives us free will to decide what to write on the pages of our lives, ... God is always there for conversation and consultation. And God left us a great guidebook called the Bible. Its lessons make our writing shine with truth and beauty." With God's guidance, what will you "write" in the new year?

Time for a spiritual assessment

"Hardly anything else reveals so well the fear and uncertainty among [people] as the length to which they will go to hide their true selves from each other and even from their own eyes," says A.W. Tozer. For insights into who we really are as Christians, the theologian proposes "rules for self-discovery." According to Tozer, "we may be known" by these seven things: what we want most, what we think about most, how we use our money, what we do with our leisure time, the company we enjoy, who and what we admire, and what we laugh at.



The "wise Christian" will find other tests, says Tozer, but these are a starting point to reveal if our desires and priorities conflict with God's will. "Our self-judgment is almost certain to be biased and imperfect," he adds, yet there's "every good reason for us to work along with the Holy Spirit in his benign effort to locate us spiritually in order that we may make such amendments as the circumstances demand."

I believe I need to share the various reasons why I attend worship with others. As many of my readers know, I've been a pastor for 22 years. That isn't the reason for my fellowshiping and communal worship with other believers. In fact, in my youth, I would be sent to church by my parents on the church bus, arrive at the church, walk in one door and out the other. I would walk over to the store which was a block away from the church, spend the money my mom would give me to put into the offering on candy and treats for myself, walk back to the church, go in the one door and out the other, get on the bus and go home. (I was not always a good boy!) I thought that if it wasn't important to my parents to come, I didn't need to go myself. At that time, my parents were Chreasters. The lack of importance to them made me believe it shouldn't be important to me. God had other plans for me.

An important person in my life, my brother David, began to attend church. At that time in our lives, life was complicated, and dysfunction was the norm. As David attended church, I noticed a change which I couldn't understand: he had a sort of peace about him and was more calm. I always wanted to be like him, so I too began to go to church. It was there that I learned about God and Jesus and of their love for me. I had sought the love of my earthly father and his approval yet felt light years away from it. At church, God and Jesus, as I was told, were LONGING to be with me! They wanted me around and they accepted me for who I was! I did end up asking Jesus into my heart eventually, but I must admit, I was over-cautious because I was let down by the best of people!

After I gave my life to Christ, it changed drastically! I would love to say that I had a great life with no problem; but that's just a dream. What I can say is that I was no longer alone going through the things I did. God provided friends and Himself to guide me and to remind me that I have His love and support, which continues even to today's writing and will until I am united with God on His side of eternity. I am motivated to come to church to serve Him and to thank Him for all He has done and continues to do for my life. I proclaim Christ because He loves this lost soul which He finds value in; enough to die for my sins so I can have fellowship with God the Father.

I might not know why you come, but I can share with you reasons why you will

want to if you know what I do about God. Take it from a once broken man: God is longing to love you the way you have searched for. We come to church to learn more about God, connecting with others who help us and allow us to help them, and we support one another. If you are not part of a faith community, I invite you to look around your local area and see where God leads you to. There are many great churches around which God can lead you to. Yes, I AM A DIFFERENT type of pastor; however, God uses those who most others wouldn't even consider making the greatest impacts. As you get to know me better, you'll see just how deeply you are loved by Marsha and I. Being your pastor means I am here to serve you and your families. But I can't be used unless you allow me into your world! This means that I can only help you if you allow the needs to be known.
