corded online worship option into the future to reach more people outside our church, and for shut-ins and those not yet ready to return to worship in person. These will continue to be posted on Sunday mornings. This service will not include joys and prayer concerns.

These social distancing practices will be in place for health and safety:

- 1. We will offer parking lot and online worship options and we ask the following persons to continue to worship through these options:
 - A. Persons who have tested positive for COVID-19 or have direct contact with a person who is positive for the virus.
 - B. Persons who are displaying symptoms of illness.
 - C. Persons with underlying health issues making exposure to COVID-19 more dangerous.
- 2. We will limit personal touch in the following ways.
 - A. Exterior doors will be opened by a masked/gloved greeter to minimize touching handles.
 - B. Interior doors will be propped open to the sanctuary and other areas to minimize touching handles.
 - C. Seating will be rearranged in a manner to provide for social distancing.
 - D. We ask that family units leave six feet of distance between themselves and the next family in the same row.
 - E. We will no longer pass offering plates down the rows. There will be plates to drop your offering into as you exit the sanctuary. Offering envelopes will be available in a basket beside the collection plates.
 - F. Hand sanitizer will be provided in the lobby.
 - G. We will be requesting that persons attending worship wear face masks. We will have some available for those who don't have one.
 - H. High touch areas will be sanitized after services.
 - I. The greeting time after worship will be suspended until a time in the future.
 - J. We will suspend printing and handing out a worship bulletin or other materials.
 - K. Solid Rock UMC will be a "nohandshake" zone for the time being.
 - L. Instructions for safe dismissal will be

given.

- 3. At the moment, all Sunday School classes before worship as well as Sunday children's ministry options will not be available, and all children will sit with their parents in the sanctuary for worship services until further notice.
- 4. Holy Communion will be practiced differently until we agree it is safe to return to our past communion practices. Instructions will be given on days communion is offered.
- 5. We will not reintroduce the Coffee Shop until we can assure relative safety in sharing food and drinks.

Many have said, "If I could just live that incident over I'd do things differently." You know what? If we made the choice we made yesterday, unless we could relive it with the knowledge we have today, more than likely we'd make the same choice as we did before.

Let's just face facts here: we make bad decisions. We get angry; we feel justified and we do things in haste as a result. God calls it sin. If we could only have a heavily armed guard in the rear protecting us from those wrong choices, mistakes, and sin that we did yesterday, wouldn't life be a whole lot easier?

In Isaiah 52:12 God, through the prophet Isaiah, speaks of this very thing. It says, "For you shall not go out in haste, nor go by flight; for the Lord will go before you, and the God of Israel will be your rear guard." Isn't that a neat thought? It tells us that God will not only go in front of us but He will also be the heavily armed guard in the back. If we listen to Him, and if we follow Him, He will not only lead us down the path of safety but He will also be at the end of the line taking care of the enemy who desires to pick us off one by one from behind.

In essence He is also saying that if we are faithful in following Him, by doing what He tells us in the Bible as it witnesses to our conscience, He will not only take us down the right road of the future, protect us and guide us today, but He will also be there to help us make the right decisions that will protect our yesterdays. In other words, we won't have to live in regret of yesterday.

I know we all make mistakes and wrong choices. The Lord knows that I've certainly made my share, and then some, of bad decisions. But that only happens when we aren't in tune with Him; when we act without seeking His will and His instruction. But when we are orchestrated with the God of Heaven, and we are following His music, the music of life, then He will become our guard against yesterday.

Beloved Gaither hymn has local tie

Solid Rock is scheduled to sing the beloved Bill Gaither hymn "He Touched Me" during a service in July. You may know that Gaither is a native Hoosier, but did you know that the inspiration for this hymn has a local connection?

As a graduate of Anderson College with a major in English and a minor in music, 27year-old Bill Gaither was teaching high school English in 1963. Weekends and evenings were spent collaborating on songs with his wife, Gloria. After writing a song,

they would duplicate it on an old mimeograph machine and hand it out for choir rehearsal at their church.



Dr. Dale Oldham was a well-known preacher in the area. His son, Doug Oldham, a gifted musician, assisted his father in his meetings. One evening in 1963, Dale Oldham invited Gaither to play piano with them at a revival meeting in Huntington, Indiana. Many people responded to the invitation to follow Christ at that meeting.

On the drive home, the three talked about how they had all felt the presence of the Holy Spirit during this meeting. In fact, it felt as if the hand of Jesus had touched them. Dropping Bill off at his home, Dr. Oldham remarked, "You should write a song that says, 'He touched me, oh, He touched me." Working through the night, Bill completed the song, revising it with Gloria the next morning.

The following week, Bill handed a copy of the handwritten song to Doug Oldham and said, "Let's see if we can sing this one tonight."

Doug was the first to record the song in 1964, but it was soon also recorded by some of the greatest names in the music industry. Elvis Presley recorded "He Touched Me" in 1971, releasing it as a single in 1972 and later that year as the title song of his album "He Touched Me." Elvis received three Grammy awards for this album.

Other versions were recorded by The Bill Gaither Trio, The Blackwood Brothers, Jimmy Durante, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Lawrence Welk, and Steven Curtis Chapman, among many others.

"He Touched Me" launched Bill Gaither's music career. He feels it was successful simply because it expresses the testimony of so many who come to Jesus: "I had no hope, I was done. Then the hand of Jesus

touched me."

The incident was especially meaningful be-

cause the child, a 9-year-old named Ronan, has autism and is generally nonverbal. Music, his family says, tends to attract his interest and make him happy. When symphony officials learned Ronan's identity, they arranged a private performance so he could meet some musicians.

How often do you shout "Wow!" — in a good way — at what you see and hear? You may tend to do so on vacation or while observing God's natural wonders, but what about during your day-to-day life? Think about the people you encounter and their talents — and your own. When have these sparked a "Wow!" of thanks to God?
