rene Church.


Please note: There will be no worship service and no Sunday school at Solid Rock on July 3.

Especially if you are interested in a study of Luke's Gospel, come and join in this growing process.



Welcoming a New Pastor

Here are a few ways a congregation can help a new pastor get off to a strong start and make that new pastor feel truly welcome.

1. Open your hearts and decide that you are going to love your new pastor.
2. Begin praying daily for the new pastor and family, even as you continue to pray for your departing pastor and family.
3. Offer food for the first few days.
4. Give gift certificates to a local restaurant.
5. Introduce yourself to the pastor repeatedly! You have one name to learn; your pastor has many names to learn.
6. Wear name tags. Even if name tags are not a tradition, the congregation can wear them for a few weeks to help the pastor learn names.
7. Make sure the pastor has a list of home

bound or nursing home members, a list of those struggling with long term illness, and a list of those still in grief over recent deaths in the family. Better yet, take the pastor for an introduction to each of these households.


8. Send your pastor a welcome note or email. Keep it brief. Introduce yourself and your family, and offer a heartfelt welcome.
9. Embrace the uniqueness of your pastor. Your pastor has a distinct personality, a unique set of spiritual gifts, and a diverse set of experiences. When the Spirit leads a church to a new pastor, the Spirit seldom leads a church to a person just like the previous pastor. To compare your new pastor to any other is to disrespect the Spirit's role in guiding you to your new pastor in the first place.
10. Be prepared to follow. A pastor who is worth his or her salt must lead in both optimal and challenging situations. And the kingdom of God is enriched when we as a congregation follow our pastor and embrace our mission with enthusiasm. Don't be a backseat driver. Serve with your best gifts.
11. Give your pastor permission to fail. The best pastors don't succeed 100% of the time. Don't hold your pastor to a standard of perfection that is impossible to maintain. Allow your minister room to make mistakes.
12. Speak positively about your pastor publicly and privately. One of the ways we bring out the best in our ministers is to speak well of them. With most pastors, it is easy to find something to criticize, because every minister has weaknesses. However, every pastor has more strengths than weaknesses. A healthy pastoral tenure is nurtured when we magnify our pastor's strengths, then minimize and compensate for our pastor's weaknesses.

All we need to know

When a loved one dies, we have questions: What caused the death? When will the funeral be? What form will our grief take? Some deaths also bring spiritual questions: Where was God? Is our loved one with God now?

Paul shared deep thoughts about death with the believers at Corinth. His complex ideas might raise further questions, but here's the key: We don't need to understand everything right away — not all of Paul's theology, or everything about God or all the practical matters around a loved one's death. Here, from 1 Corinthians 15 (NRSV), is what we do know: "Christ has been raised from the dead" (v. 20) — death doesn't have the final say. "All will be made alive in Christ" (v. 22) — a loving promise




God offers to all. "The last enemy to be destroyed is death" (v. 26) — in the end, Jesus will destroy all sickness, pain, sorrow, war, poverty, oppression and even death itself. We are in God's loving hands. That's all we need to know.

clergy and spouses who passed in the last year. Interspersed with these highlights, sadly, was evidence that divisions in the larger denomination are also present in the Indiana Conference.

Reports from more than 40 committees, agencies, ministries, and affiliated institutions were received throughout the three-day Conference.

The Council on Finance and Administration reported 2021 income of

\$12,018,142 and expenditures of \$12,017,450, netting a surplus of \$692. This includes the Indiana Conference apportionment of \$4,559,526 to the General Church. A proposed Conference budget of \$7,040,053 (not including General Church apportionment) was approved.

Five resolutions were brought before the Conference. One resolution had been withdrawn as the issue addressed has been resolved. Two resolutions were ruled out of order by the Bishop.

A resolution titled "Building BeLoved Community Now" was defeated by a vote of 402 to 410. This resolution proposed that a document titled "Covenant to Build BeLoved Community" be used as a guiding document to shape the ministry of the United Methodist Church in Indiana.

Another resolution, titled "A Commitment to Grace in the Indiana Conference," called for "honor and trust [for] contextual expressions of ministry, including the decisions of clergy to choose which weddings they officiate and congregations to choose which weddings they host, so long as they are between two consenting, committed adults." Following lengthy discussion, the resolution was approved by a vote of 380 for and 332 against. This resolution has been appealed, with some questioning whether parts of its language conflict with the Book of Discipline. The Board of Camps and Retreats reported on the Conference's seven campsites. They received \$758,339 in Paycheck Protection Program funds, which paid salaries, maintained buildings, and allowed staff to prepare for a partial reopening in 2021. The camps opened at 50% capacity last summer. They recorded 198 first-time



commitments to Christ, 233 recommitments to Christ, 488 volunteers, and 168 who acknowledged God's call on their lives. All camps are fully open for summer 2022.

The Board of Trustees reported that 29 churches in the Conference disaffiliated from the United Methodist Church in 2022. With more applications for disaffiliation in process, Bishop Trimble has called a special session to act on these requests on November 19, 2022. The Bishop stated that, "If you are leaving The United Methodist Church ... you are not my enemy! We are all children of the Most High God! Some may choose to walk another trail, but I trust that making disciples of Jesus Christ will be our common hymn."

While there was much to celebrate at Annual Conference 2022, the reality that the Conference is experiencing much change as churches seek to discern the context in which they are called to serve Jesus in their communities was evident. Please pray for all United Methodist congregations, including Solid Rock, as they determine their path forward.

Oxygen for ministry

Flight attendants instruct airplane passengers that if oxygen masks are needed, we should secure our own before assisting someone else. Why? If we aren't getting enough oxygen ourselves, we can't help another person for long.

The Holy Spirit empowers Christians for ministry — the work of loving and caring for our neighbors and God's creation. But if we aren't Spirit-fueled on an ongoing basis, we will soon lack capacity to serve. This may manifest as burnout, cynicism, exhaustion or even lack of faith. So how to ensure we're breathing in the Spirit's energy and guidance instead of poor-quality "air"?

By taking part in corporate worship regularly, immersing ourselves in the Scriptures (devotional reading and Bible study), praying "continually" (1 Thessalonians 5:17, NIV) and spending time with Christian friends and mentors. Opening ourselves to the Spirit in these ways allows the Breath of God to flow into us, which in turn empowers us to reach out to others in love.
