Five feet and five minutes

Following is an email I recently received from the granddaughter who lives with her husband and the world's most special great-granddaughter in Florida:

"...last week an elderly woman, and her equally elderly passenger, crashed through our backyard privacy fence, through Nicole's gym set, our screened-in patio and finally came to stop in our living room. She was able to continue on after the fence because instead of hitting her brakes, in her confusion, she kept stomping on the accelerator.

"The love seat was against the sliding glass door that she smashed and it became a projectile destroying most of our living room. Minutes before, Marc and Nicole had been sitting on it putting their shoes on as they were getting ready to leave for school and work. They had gone into the garage and were just getting in the car as the crash occurred. The women were not injured but were taken to the hospital because they were confused and upset.

"You never think of a freak accident like this happening to you, but five feet and five minutes could have changed all our lives. The driver had missed the two propane tanks for the gas grill in the garage. And five minutes earlier my family was in the path of destruction. I know my angels were working overtime. I drop to my knees and thank God that He was watching out for my family, the two women and my neighbors. I am truly praising Him and thanking Him for His mercy.

"Another lesson learned ... Ordinarily when I wake Nicole in the morning, I crawl into her bed and we cuddle for five minutes, but sometimes life gets in the way ... as it did that morning. I was rushed. You know the excuses we allow ourselves. But I vow, I will never let another morning go by (at least until she gets too old to let me do it) without crawling in her bed to cuddle.

I take the time to know and understand the best way to communicate my love to each and every child. My children see my love for my wife clearly expressed.

Mutual Respect


By honoring and never ridiculing the thoughts, emotions and actions of my family, each member clearly experiences and understands my great respect for them.

Consistently Predictable

My family is comforted and anchored by my predictability. My deepest values are consistently demonstrated in my speech and behavior.

Predictable Spontaneity

My family knows that I am extremely curious and love to explore and learn. My spontaneity is consistent. We plan with flexibility, and the children look forward to unexpected adventures.



Responsible

My children see how I prepare and follow through, owning up to my responsibilities. They learn by my example.

Safety/Security

I take safety very seriously and my children know it. They have learned by my examples, for instance: I always wear a helmet when skating, skiing or bicycle riding, and I take first-aid and CPR classes. Our car does not go into motion until all seat belts, including mine, are on.

Advocate

My children know that I stand behind them and will protect, defend and honor them at all times. I do not discuss my children's failings with others.

Serious Humor

I deliberately use humor liberally to lighten stress and lubricate relationships to ensure a cohesive family.

WYSIWYG What you see is what you get


I practice what I preach and that includes accepting human frailty and mistakes. The greatest foundation for a family is living with integrity.
