In-person worship to resume June 14

In-person worship is resuming! What will it look like? Our Governor, Eric Holcomb, announced on May 1 a plan for getting Indiana "Back on Track" in the next weeks and months.

That plan allows churches to return to in -person worship beginning on May 10. Other leaders, including our Bishop,



Julius Trimble, are calling for a slower pace of return.

We will return to worship together in the sanctuary on Sunday, June 14, unless a spike in COVID-19 cases and deaths in the next few weeks makes that too risky. A phone tree message will be sent out with any changes in the expected date of return to in-person worship.

For those who are not comfortable coming into the building at this time, we will offer an option to come into the parking lot and listen to the service via FM radio. The service will be broadcast on FM frequency 87.9 starting at 10:00 a.m. This will be the entire service including joys and prayer concerns. You will need to be in the parking lot to be able to hear the service.

We will also continue to offer a prerecorded online worship option into the future to reach more people outside our church, and for shut-ins and those not yet ready to return to worship in person. These will continue to be posted on Sunday mornings. This service will not include joys and prayer concerns.

These social distancing practices will be in place for health and safety:

- 1. We will offer parking lot and online worship options and we ask the following persons to continue to worship through these options:
 - A. Persons who have tested positive for COVID-19 or have direct contact with a person who is positive for the virus.
 - B. Persons who are displaying symptoms of illness.
 - C. Persons with underlying health issues making exposure to COVID-19 more dangerous.
- 2. We will limit personal touch in the following ways.
 - A. Exterior doors will be opened by a masked/gloved greeter to minimize touching handles.
 - B. Interior doors will be propped open to the sanctuary and other areas to minimize touching handles.
 - C. Seating will be rearranged in a manner to provide for social distancing.
 - D. We ask that family units leave six feet of distance between themselves and the next family in the same row.
 - E. We will no longer pass offering plates down the rows. There will be plates to drop your offering into as you exit the sanctuary. Offering envelopes will be available in a basket beside the collection plates.
 - F. Hand sanitizer will be provided in the lobby.
 - G. We will be requesting that persons attending worship wear face masks. We will have some available for those who don't have one.
 - H. High touch areas will be sanitized after services.
 - I. The greeting time after worship will (Continued on page 3)



Every once in a while something will be said that we don't quite agree with, or something will be done that we don't think should be done at the time, and it may get under our skin. In Luke 2:49 Jesus was 12 years old and was not found in the caravan as they were going home. When Mary and Joseph found him they questioned him but *(Continued on page 3)*

- J. We will suspend printing and handing out a worship bulletin or other materials.
- K. Solid Rock UMC will be a "nohandshake" zone for the time being.
- L. Instructions for safe dismissal will be given.
- 3. At the moment, all Sunday School classes before worship as well as Sunday children's ministry options will not be available, and all children will sit with their parents in the sanctuary for worship services until further notice.
- 4. Holy Communion will be practiced differently until we agree it is safe to return to our past communion practices. Instructions will be given on days communion is offered.
- 5. We will not reintroduce the Coffee Shop until we can assure relative safety in sharing food and drinks.

he answered, "Why were you searching for me? Didn't you know I had to be in my Father's house?"

At 12 years old Jesus had already set his priorities to do the will of the Father. How did he know what he was supposed to do everyday? As you study the Gospels you find that Jesus withdrew himself and prayed. As you study deeper, he would be alone each morning before daylight and talk with the Father. God would give him instructions and guide him by the Holy Spirit. Then there will be no question as to what the priorities are.

Let's look at the person named the second most in the Gospels, Peter. Some say he was always messing up and sticking his foot in his mouth. I disagree. He wanted to know everything he could know about Jesus Christ the Messiah. He would ask questions when no one else would. He would do things that no one else would do because he wanted to know. He had set his priorities to know Christ and to become as close to him as he could. He didn't care what it looked like.

What about Paul? He persecuted the Christians with zeal. When Christ got hold of him on the road to Damascus, he changed his perspectives and his priorities and his priorities became to spread the word of God no matter what it cost him. He was beaten and stoned and shipwrecked, but he kept his priorities with God first.

Where are your priorities? I don't want your answer that is between you and God, who by the way already has the answer. So if you tell yourself anything less than the full truth you are only lying to yourself. Are we any better than Christ himself, who being filled with the Holy Ghost needed to talk to God? It boggles my mind that we can go through the day, the week, the month or the year without talking with God. I imagine that some people believe that they don't need to spend time with God to figure out where their priorities should be. The rest of us need that daily time with God. Just think about it. What has priority in your life?

Ideas for celebrating Pentecost at home

Pentecost, an important day in the life of the church, can be a wonderful opportunity for family worship, discussions about church and the Holy Spirit, and a celebration of our faith. Pentecost is celebrated the seventh Sunday after Easter, May 31, 2020.

On Pentecost Sunday, we remember the day the disciples received the Holy Spirit in a special way. There was a powerful wind and tongues of fire (see Acts 2:1-41). With the gift of the Spirit, the disciples were

able to tell people from all over the world about Jesus in ways each could understand. The Bible reports that about 3,000 people were baptized that day, creating the first church.



Creatively celebrating Pen- Pentecost tecost in the

home can be a wonderful addition to your family's devotional life, as you give thanks to God for the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the church.

Here are some ideas to help get you started.

- Wear red: Red is the color of Pentecost, symbolizing the Holy Spirit's arrival with tongues of fire.
- Pretend to be Peter: Peter was concerned that some people misunderstood the disciples' faith and the work of the Holy Spirit. If you were Peter today, what would you want to say to help others understand what it means to follow Jesus?
- Tell the story: Read together the story of Pentecost in Acts 2. Imagine the scene. Ask each family member what they will try to remember from the story.
- Enjoy the wind: Make and fly a kite. Blow bubbles and watch the wind carry them away. Play with pinwheels. Talk about all the wind does, even though you cannot see it.
- Pray together: The Rev. MaryJane Pierce Norton shares the following prayer for families to use:

Gracious God. We are reminded again when the first believers in Jesus were given the courage to tell others about Jesus. We believe you give us that same courage to tell others about Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit. You know, O God, that sometimes we are fearful and we feel alone. But just like that Pentecost long ago, we, too, are surrounded by your love and presence. Help us live in such a way that others see in us a reflection of your love. Help us have the courage to tell others about the difference it makes in our lives to trust in your love and care. Help us see those around who want to be in the fellowship of Christians. Help us to witness to one another so that we grow in faith. Through the power of your Holy Spirit and
