Capital Campaign Update

Of the original capital campaign commitments of \$556,373, as of September 30 a total of \$517,447, or 93%, has been received. Over and above campaign commitments, an additional \$361,944 has been given, for a total of \$849,421. Thank you for your generosity and faithfulness! Some borrowing will still be required to fund this project, and the Capital Campaign Committee encourages those who can to continue giving as they are able beyond their original commitment to reduce this debt as quickly as possible.

Construction progress continues at a steady pace. The parking lot has been paved, and those who wish to view the construction can do so from the parking area.

Holiday Cheese Balls




Youth Fellowship

Her opening thoughts were from the book of Mark, chapter 11, verse 25. They dealt with our problems of forgiveness as part of our prayer life, which may include both our giving unintended wounds and receiving unexpected hurts. Compassion and forgiveness with others, perhaps even a sense of humor, may be needed.

Mission Moment reflections were shared by Naomi Oxley, who led us to think about “traveling the path of Jesus.” How can we pray like Jesus? He chose to be alone, perhaps in a deserted place. How can we do this? Sometimes it is hard to focus. We can pray silently, we can close our eyes. What shall we pray for? It is best, perhaps, kept short and simple. We can know that often we must wait and answers seem slow. What to pray for? Jesus taught us how to pray in our Lord’s Prayer.

Pastor Kathy Newton presented our program today, entitled “Radical Hospitality.” Related scripture was the Bible’s account of the story of the rival relationships of Sarah and Hagar and their sons as told in the book of Genesis. October opens the fall season, which many experience as a time of good family gatherings. Are there any elements of anger, mistrust or struggle? How can we celebrate the “other” in our lives? Who will we make space for at our holiday tables? Radical hospitality is drastically different from “the usual.” How can we offer the gracious hospitality of Jesus to others? We must be open to listening to them.

Business meeting time included regular reports from secretary and treasurer and an announcement from Myrna that she bought two new books at a recent district meeting she attended. Margaret Bell offered to make up a history of U.M.W. books which are available to members from years 2007 to 2013, with short descriptions of contents. A member now needs to read five books to file for recognition; she may also read just for personal pleasure and learning. Future U.M.W. events were discussed, and next month’s unit meeting was specially discussed, with encouragement for attendance

Listen up!

Since 2008, the Friday after Thanksgiving has been dubbed the National Day of Listening. The nonprofit group StoryCorps encourages people to spend an hour recording an interview with a loved one, rather than battle mall crowds.



Dave Isay began StoryCorps in 2003 as an oral-history project, based on the simple idea that everyone has an authentic story worth hearing. “This is about nothing but

the generosity of listening,” Isay says. “When you’re listening to [the stories] of everyday people — with their acts of kindness and courage that we don’t take the time to honor — you’re walking on holy ground.”

As you gather with family and friends this Thanksgiving, remember to keep your ears open!

A simple act

Traditional thank-you notes are rare in this age of texting and social networking. But California lawyer John Kralik set out to change that. On January 1, 2008, at a low point in his life, Kralik vowed to send one note of appreciation to a different person every day for one year.

Although it took him a bit longer to reach the 365-note mark, Kralik’s intentional focus on gratitude changed his life.

“I saw how much I had been blessed by so many people in different ways,” he says, “and acknowledging their blessings seemed to make them multiply.”

After Kralik documented his experiences in *A Simple Act of Gratitude* (Hyperion), people wrote to share how the effects of gratitude rippled out. By the beginning of 2012, having written his 860th thank-you note, Kralik said he’d learned that “gratitude is a path to the peace we all seek.”

A formula for kingdom success

IBM founder Thomas Watson said the formula to success is to double one’s failure rate because failure is the best teacher.


Jesus tells of a businessman who entrusted his money with servants. One servant hid the funds, fearing that investment might bring loss rather than gain. On learning this, the businessman grew angry.

God calls us to take risks for his sake. Yet we often keep silent about the gospel, fearing that others won’t believe us. We stick with familiar congregational fellowship instead of venturing into the uncertainty of community service.

When taking risks for God appears to result in failure, two things are surely at play: We have the opportunity to learn from our experience, discovering new ways to witness and grow stronger in faith. Second, we can trust God to tend the seeds we’ve planted; they’ll sprout in due time, whether or not we see it.

Imperfect faith

Who said, “There is such terrible darkness within me, as if everything was dead”? Amazingly, the same person who said, “Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love” — Mother Teresa!



Yes, the devout nun who worked many years among India’s poor experienced doubt as well as faith, darkness as well as light. Why would we expect otherwise? She was an inspiring model of discipleship, yes, but human, after all.
