Report from Annual Conference

The 2020 Indiana Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church was held on August 15 at Indiana Wesleyan University and on October 10 virtually online. Due to the pandemic, most delegates attended the




Luke 6:46-49. ⁴⁶"Why do you call me, 'LORD, LORD,' and do not do what I say?"

⁴⁷As for everyone who comes to me and hears my words and puts them into practice, I will show you what they are like.

⁴⁸They are like a man building a house, who dug down deep and laid the foundation on rock. When a flood came, the torrent struck that house but could not shake it, because it was well built.

⁴⁹But the one who hears my words and does not put them into practice is like a man who built a house on the ground without a foundation. The moment the torrent struck that house, it collapsed and its destruction was complete."



Here the Lord starts out asking a question. How can you call me Lord and Master but you don't do the things that I tell you? I lay things out for you; all you have to do is trust me and do them and you won't even do that.

He compares it to something that we can all understand. He compares it to building a house. If you are going to build a good house you must dig down deep so that the foundation is solid. The taller you want the house to be the deeper the foundation must go.

It is the same with the life of a Chris-

A lachrymatory lesson

To calm his crying children, Charles Ferrell used to say, "Wait until I get a jar! I want to catch and save your tears." While he pretended to search for a vessel, his kids usually quieted down.

Tear jars were actually common in biblical times. Called *lachrymatories*, they're still sold in Old Jerusalem. Bible characters had a variety of uses for these jars. The woman who cried at Jesus' feet may have felt such sorrow about her wayward lifestyle that she brought a jar of her tears and added to them. In Psalm 23:5 (KJV), the cup that "runneth over" may have referred to a lachrymatory filled with tears of joy due to God's goodness.

tian. If you want to soar with the eagles or walk hand in hand with Christ you must get deep into the word of God. You can not expect to just do surface reading through the Bible and build a good solid foundation. You must really dig in and understand what the Lord is talking about. If you don't understand a word pull out a dictionary. If you don't understand what is being said follow the references and pull out a commentary. But it takes more than just reading the Bible like a story book. Get a good understanding and the Lord will set you on a solid foundation.

Lets look at the house on a shallow foundation or no foundation at all. The water will erode the dirt under the foundation and animals will tunnel under the foundation and before you know it the foundation cracks and the walls start falling apart and the house falls down.

It is the same with a Christian. If we only read the Bible like a story book, then it doesn't get set in us. If we don't understand what we read we will not allow it to become a part of us and the foundation is shallow. When hard times come or we talk to someone about Christ we are easily confused and our feet get knocked out from under us and before long we believe the same as whoever we are talking to. We become as the ocean tide, we believe one thing when we talking to one person and something else when we are talking to another person. This is not how the Lord wants us to be.

Someone that wants to see signs and wonders following them is like the man that wants to build a skyscraper. The rule is the higher you want to go, the deeper you must dig.

August 15 meeting virtually or at a remote site.

Routine business was addressed. Reports were heard from Conference Lay Leader David Johns, the United Methodist Foundation of Indiana, Inc., the Board of Pension and Health Benefits, and Emerging Leaders.

Emily Reece, Director of Church Development, presented two newly-chartered churches: Disciples Korean UMC in West Lafayette (January 2020) and Abundant Vida Nueva UMC in Indianapolis (December 2019).

Emily Krach, reporting for Children Matter Most, noted that Indiana has the second highest infant mortality rate in the Midwest, that Indiana has the highest rate in the country of teens who have considered suicide and the second-highest of those who have attempted it, and that, compared to neighboring states, Indiana has the highest rate of children in the foster care system.

During the Celebration of Ministry on August 15, 57 retirees were honored for their 1,705 combined years of service. Four persons were commissioned for the work of deacon, and nine persons were commissioned for the work of elder. Two were recognized as associate members, one person was ordained into the Order of Deacon, and twelve were ordained into the Order of Elder.

Bishop Julius Trimble offered his message "Climbing our Second Mountain" without wearing his shoes, though he donned his United Methodist socks. "Where God's name is proclaimed and Christ is lifted as our Lord and Savior is holy ground," he said. Bishop Trimble referenced David Brooks' book, *The Second Mountain: The Quest for a Moral Life*, as he defined a "second mountain." people who radiate joy and clarity of purpose. He encouraged members to live that way. "We can choose joy. We can choose justice. We can choose life with Jesus!"

Rev. Dr. Aleze Fulbright opened the Celebration of Life Service on October 10 with prayer and scripture. Rev. Dave Neckers preached on Proverbs 13:22, challenging the Conference to leave an inheritance through investing in the lives of others. The Conference then honored the lives of 46 clergy and 30 spouses who have joined the Church Triumphant during the last year.

The Conference Nominations Committee's report was accepted. Clarifying language to the Rules and Structure document was approved. The report of the Board of Trustees was accepted.

The ministries of legacy churches were celebrated. There were three church mergers and seven church closures within the last year.

The Conference recognized the oldest ordained Elder by presenting the Conference Cane to 98-year-old Chester Mahan.

Larry Whitehead recognized the members of the Blue Ribbon Task Force, which was tasked to examine the way the Conference is organized and make recommendations moving forward. He presented the Master Plan, including the reduction of two Conference Superintendents and one Conference Director. The report was approved as presented.

The Council on Finance & Administration reported that the Conference has experienced a significant decline in tithe giving, a reduction of 9% (\$575,000) as of August. The Conference has received \$1,232,685 as part of the Payroll Protection Plan, which is expected to be forgiven. The Conference approved the 2021 budget, with approximately \$7 million designated for the mission and work of the Indiana Conference and approximately \$4.3 million for the worldwide ministry of the United Methodist

Church.

The Conference heard an update on the plan for making anti-racism more of a priority, including the designation of \$50,000 for further development of anti-racism efforts.

Bishop Trimble shared an impassioned Episcopal Address entitled "Always – A Promise We Should Remember," based on Matthew 28:19-20, during which he encouraged members of the Conference to remember that God is with us always, even in the midst of life's storms.

A total of 1,598 registered delegates participated in the Conference. Solid Rock was represented by Paul Burris (clergy delegate) and Gary Walter (lay delegate). Detailed information regarding Annual Conference may be viewed at inumc.org/annual-conference/.

In 2016, Wanda Dench texted 17-year-old Jamal Hinton about Thanksgiving dinner, thinking she was contacting her grandson. When a skeptical Hinton requested a photo and received a selfie of someone with a different skin color, he chuckled — but then asked if he could still come eat! Thus began a new friendship and a new annual tradition, which Hinton documents online. “Family is more than blood,” says Dench. “It’s the people you want to be with.”

This year’s meal will be bittersweet, with an empty chair for Dench’s husband, who died of Covid-19 in April. To show support after that loss, Hinton sent his “grandma” a collection of loving video messages. Strangers worldwide expressed condolences to a woman who’d fully embraced a stranger.
