Couple donates "Mission Bell" to Solid Rock

Solid Rock United Methodist Church • Warren, Indiana

Solid Rock recently received the gift of a mission bell from John and Doris Paul, Dogwood Drive residents who have attended Solid Rock on several occasions. This bell was obtained by the Pauls in 1969 at an antique store in Upperville, Virginia.

John has researched the history of the bell and has been told it was cast in Spain. Many bell enthusiasts have seen the bell, but none have definitively identified its origin or use, and have commented on its rarity. It has been suggested that it was used at a small church, part of a larger mission in the Southwest.

The bell is suspended in a cast iron frame, 35 inches in height. The bell itself is 15 inches. The bell and frame together weigh 65 pounds. A few hammer marks on the interior attest to its use over a short time period.

John's letter notifying the church of this donation concludes: "Doris and I appreciate the prudent manner your church has gone about in planning and finalizing your building goals. The membership appears to be enthusiastic, engaged and caring. The number of young people attending is a very good sign for the long-term future. What better place to entrust this symbolic treasure for preservation and use? Therefore, we would be proud if you and your church advisors accept donation of this bell for any use you feel appropriate."

Thanks to the Pauls for this generous donation. Solid Rock trustees are currently considering an appropriate location for the bell.





The ultimate sacrifice

At www.IAmSecond.com, soldier-turnedpastor Chris Plekenpol shares a powerful experience from his service in Iraq. When a terrorist drove a bomb-carrying car into a tank, the detonator didn't work, but the car's gas tank exploded. As the would-be attacker tried to escape the flames. Plekenpol had a brief opportunity to save the man's life. But he realized he wasn't willing to die for an enemy.

After the man was dead, Plekenpol considered how much he had in common with him. "I've been an enemy of God," he said. "Yet he didn't sit back and just watch me die. He decided to come from heaven to earth to take that blast for me." Because of Christ's heroic, selfless act, "I owe him everything." Plekenpol says.

"For ... while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son ... " (Romans 5:10, NRSV).

When we tell ourselves "I can never change" or "That will never happen," we presume too much and believe too little. In Jesus Christ, God renders all of our final conclusions premature and all of our talk of determinism as simply bad faith. In Christ, God opens closed doors, brings resurrections, reveals possibilities, reclaims the lost, liberates the cursed and possessed, and changes the unchangeable.
